
- Considerations to be taken into acount are the Built and Archaeological Heritage together with the Essential Character of the Parish.
 - Built Heritage
 - Listed Buildings
 - 1 Church, 1 Charnel House, 3 Churchyard Monuments, 7 Farm Houses, 2 Granaries, 2 Barns, 8 Houses, Cliffe Fort (National Monument), 2 Local Monuments (Curtis & Harvey explosives works and GHQ stop Line Not Listed)
 - Earliest being St Helens Church which dates from latter half of 12th century to the latest being a19th century weatherboard bakery
 - Many of the houses and farms were extensively enlarged and altered over the years

Cliffe Woods

- The area now known as Cliffe Woods was originally part of Mortimers Manor which came into the possesion of the Earls of Darnley.
- The land was sold to speculators post WW1 divided into plots which were then sold on to individuals in a "plotlands" development called Rochester Park Estate.
- SRDC started CP and planning in the Mid 1960's with planning permission granted in Feb 1970.

- Archaeological Heritage
 - Paleolithic 500,000 to 125,00 BC handaxes foreshore
 - Mesolithic 100,000 to 4300 BC mainly flints/bones Cliffe Pools & Cliffe Woods
 - Neolithic 4300 to 2300 BC settlement close to Courtsole Farm
 - Bronze Age 2350 to 701 BC Beaker burials and settlement near St Helens & North of Cliffe Woods
 - Iron Age/Roman 800 BG to 410 AD extensive settlement & Industry
 - Saxon 450 to 1066 AD extensive settlement & monastic activity
 - Medieval 600 to 1485 St Helens N transcept Norman church with again extensive settlement & monastic activity verified with registered finds
 - General rule for the parish desk based assement, Geophys mandatory & pits/trenches if necessary

- Maintaining desirable Character
 - Cliffe Village
 - You can chart the history of the village from late medieval to modern day walking through the village by the architecture and materials of the buildings and walls.
 - Timber frame construction, Georgian red brick, yellow local stock brick 19th cent and 20th cent modern red brick
 - Cliffe Woods
 - Plotlands heritage with 20/30's bungalows plus 2(?) surviving PL dwellings.
 - 1970's development that included self build with varied build styles
 - More uniform estate development included for remainder.
